The Grade Ones have been busy learning how to measure length. They are measuring height, width, and depth of people and objects. The children are enjoying the different measuring activities, including working in groups to make a long train of paper, and then gluing all the trains together to make one long train. In the end, our paper train stretched from the outside door by our classroom to the gym door! In our Language Arts classes, we are reading books with digraphs and new sight words. We are continuing to do writing activities, too. We are ending our month with Easter activities that will continue after Spring Break.

Grade 2

March was a busy month in the Grade 2 classroom! From the excitement of trying to catch a leprechaun on St. Patrick's Day to chicks hatching in the classroom, there was a lot to do! We wrote letters to Mrs. Snydmiller to wish her a speedy recovery and let her know how we are doing at school. A favorite activity in Science with Mrs. Snydmiller was making Jello while learning about the different states of water: solid, liquid and gas. Grade 3

Grade 3's prepared and presented four shadow plays to their parents and our younger students. Each shadow play featured a folktale from one of the four countries that we study in our Social Studies class: a Peruvian folktale "Llama saves the people", a Ukrainian folktale "The birds' gift", an Indian folktale "Ram saves Sita" and a Tunisian folktale "Jha and his donkey". The shows were a huge success! Grade 3's enjoyed entertaining diverse audiences and manipulating their puppets! You did a wonderful job, grade 3's!



The students were shocked to learn that in the



early hours of March 17th a leprechaun entered the grade 3 classroom and left a note on the whiteboard. The note had spelling and punctuation mistakes. As a class we took the opportunity to learn from the leprechaun

Grade 5








Grade 8 & 9 Fieldtrip






